Imagine that the NW corner bank a postman would take a boat over to deliver mail to the SE side of the lake on 72-73 Avenues. Just over from where I live, 109 St, was a dirt road with the trolley line. The trolley train popped many people off where they enjoyed their day in summer picnicking, tenting, sailing, rowing, whereas in winter they bobsledded down the slide, skated, snowshoed and warmed themselves in a little shack. This was a recreational meeting place. The talk of the town. A neighbor just down the lane from me dug down and discovered a large cement block that is likely the platform for the slide. When I first dug a garden on my west side, I dug up a Victorian style jar. Imagining it to be for pickles.

As the fall season progresses note a picture of the pocket park on 112st and 80th Avenue. It has been gardened by diligent residents for many years. It's a lovely place to reflect, enjoy the colors, textures, in a transition place between residences, a new off leash dog park, and the University of Alberta Hospital.

A few more participants once-a-week time to plant and tend to its nourishment are needed in the spring. Gardens like life, ebb and flow, as the tenders of it age or availability changes.

Yielding to emergency vehicles

When an emergency vehicle approaches with lights and siren activated:

- Safely clear the intersection if you're in the middle.
- Signal, move to the right side of the road, slow down, and stop.
- On a one-way street move to the nearest curb.
- Wait for the emergency vehicle to pass. Re-enter traffic flow when all emergency vehicles have passed.
- Do not break the rules of the road (illegal turns, etc.) in order to give right of way to an emergency vehicle.

When passing any stopped roadside vehicle with flashing lights activated (emergency vehicles, tow trucks, maintenance trucks, etc.):

- Reduce speed to 60 km/h or the posted speed, whichever is lower, if you are in the lane immediately next to the stopped vehicles. Failure to do so can result in a fine and demerit points.
- If safe to do so, move over to the adjacent lane.
- If you're not in the lane next to the stopped vehicles, reduce speed and leave lots
 of space between yourself and emergency personnel.

All about snow removal

Snow and ice are on their way, and that means it's time to bring out the shovels and sand to get ready for sidewalk shovelling. In Edmonton, residents and property owners are responsible for ensuring that sidewalks on and beside their properties are maintained all winter. Here are some things you need to know about winter snow removal.

been consolidated in a smaller number of locations, 100 in all. This will reduce the cost - and the city hopes that having fewer locations will allow them to make sure the boxes are always stocked with sand.

The sand locations closest to McKernan include:

- Joe Morris Park (108 St. & University Ave.): SE corner of park
- City Arts Centre (109 St. & 83 Ave): SE corner of parking lot
- 116 St. entrance to South Campus (off Belgravia Rd): parking lot near the pedestrian bridge access
- Southwest Roadway Maintenance Yard (6609 Gateway Boulevard).

Assistance for seniors and people with disabilities has changed

Due to insurance concerns, many community leagues, including McKernan, are no longer providing shovelling services for residents. Instead, targeted programs are available to low-income seniors and residents with disabilities and mobility challenges.

For seniors: The City has partnered with the Government of Alberta, which offers snow removal support for low-income seniors. This is applied for via the provincial Special Needs Assistance for Seniors, and can be done through many organizations including the Strathcona Place Seniors Society, 10831 University Ave., (780) 433-5807.

For people with a permanent or temporary disability: The City will coordinate and pay to remove snow from the private property accessible walkway and public sidewalks adjacent to the property of those with disabilities and mobility challenges. (There must be no individuals residing in the household who can perform snow removal.) Participants must provide a signed authorized health care provider form to confirm that they cannot perform any activities related to snow removal. Current participants of the Dedicated Accessible Transit Service and the Assisted Waste Collection programs can enrol in the Assisted Snow Removal Pilot through a simplified process.

Move your vehicle to let the plows work

If we get significant snowfall, the city can declare a parking ban that may extend to residential streets. If a residential parking ban is declared, you have eight hours to remove any vehicles from roadways. Violators will be ticketed (\$250) or maybe towed. To stay up on bans, sign up for email reminders of plowing at edmonton.ca/SafeTravels, where you can also see an outline of the snow clearing service levels and view real-time maps of snow clearing on roadway and active pathways.
